Face Masks for the Front Lines – Conservators at Amsterdam's Rijksmuseum are donating their surgical masks and gloves to who are in dire need of supplies.



Remembering Genesis P-Orridge – The artist died after a two-year battle with cancer , and is remembered for a gender-bending life that was dedicated to art, music, and individuality.

A New Normal at the Met – The Metropolitan Museum of Art is expecting a shortfall of as much as \$100 million, but the museum's leaders have a three-prong plan for the coming months.

An Oxford College Caper – Thieves stole \$12 million worth of Old Master paintings from the Christ Church Picture Gallery at the University of Oxford.

Paddle8 Files for Bankruptcy – The online auction house filed for Chapter 11 protection this week, shortly after allegations of misallocating funds were made public.

Art Fair Freeze – One of the most hotly anticipated spring art events, Frieze New York, set to open in May, was cancelled this week.

Museums Shutter Around the World – What began in the US is extending overseas as museums across the UK are now closing to the public until the current health crisis can get under control.

Auction Houses Shift the Calendar – Christie's and Phillips will hold mega-sales in June after cancelling their spring auctions in New York.

Met Gala Postponed – The super chic event has been called off amid the current crisis, which will likely have dire consequences for the Costume Institute's budget next year.
